
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

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Iconic Elk Shoals: a Beach in the Mountains

Where the New River snakes through North Carolina high country mountain slopes, Elk Shoals sits tucked away on the banks of the South Fork New River, among the lush piney glens of Ashe County.

Known by some for its sandy swimming beach situated at the front of the property along a bend of the cool, wide New River, the bulk of Elk Shoal's 270 acres has been locked away for use as a Methodist church camp since the 1950s. This beautiful piece of property was purchased by New River Conservancy in December 2018, according to NRC President George Santucci.

"It's one of those iconic places," Santucci said. "It's been here so long and it has served so many young people — it's one of those places that's a part the fabric of Ashe County."

Since being purchased by the conservancy with trust fund grants and money from private donors,

Elk Shoals has been turned over to the North Carolina parks system and is now an extension of New River State Park.

"This is the first acquisition outside of the originally designated 26.5 miles that has been New River State Park," Santucci said. "It adds a whole additional day and night to the park's overnight paddling and camping trip. What you used to be able to do in four days and three nights, now you've got five days and four nights, starting upstream at Elk Shoals."

According to Santucci, volunteers, contractors, park and conservancy staff are all working together to 're-wild' Elk Shoals. The re-wilding process involves converting the old Methodist camp to state park standards by way of demolishing a few decrepit buildings on the property, removing nonnative plant species, improving parking and landscaping, as well as installing campsites and refining the already-existing system of hiking trails, among other tasks, Santucci said.

"Phase one is essentially complete," Santucci explained. "Phase two is campground space and phase three probably won't start until next year, but it should be all finished by the end of 2020."

There are two ADA-accessible bunkhouses on the property that were built but never used by the church, according to Santucci. With a few small improvements, those bunkhouses will be rentable and capable of sleeping up to as many as 20 people each.

"There'll be a much smaller human footprint out there and a much larger wooded and natural area, as you would expect to find from a state park," Santucci said. "The Chapel on the New will be preserved as a community center and a place that's available, rentable and usable for all kinds of things-weddings, meetings, family gatherings, whatever."


While the bonus features of the Elk Shoals property are being prepared for the public's use, most of the 270 acres is already accessible by foot via a mix of paved and gravel roadways, and 3 to 5 miles of hiking trails are in fairly good shape and should be ready to open as soon as park rangers are able to clear and mark the way, according to Santucci.

"The only thing needed to get the trails in shape is cleaning up deadfall and getting the signage replaced and brought up to state park standards," Santucci said.

Elk Shoals is significant to New River State Park not only for its size and for the amenities soon to be offered there, but for the broader implications of what the park can become as it continues to expand.

"What Elk Shoals means for the state park, the county and any river lover is multiple things," says Santucci. "Now the state park realizes it can look beyond, and look at other expansion opportunities upstream and downstream — North Fork included."

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For a county whose number two industry—behind agriculture—is tourism, Ashe County's administrative leaders have been interested and engaged in the acquisition of Elk Shoals, according to Santucci.

"It means if the county can supplement what the state is doing and install some county-managed river access points, it will allow more access for the public to get on the river and float to or from Elk Shoals," Santucci said. "Next to Christmas trees and cattle, this is the next big thing — it's all part of a bigger plan that the county is embracing."

Nowhere else in Ashe County is there a beach to swim at, and the near-threatened

hellbender salamander is known to swim in the New River along Elk Shoals, making the land well worth preserving as a state park, according to Santucci.

"The beauty of what we're doing now, is while Elk Shoals was available to a large audience, it was still a private and restricted audience. You had to either be part of the Methodist church, or pay to use it," Santucci said. "Now it is a state park, available to anybody. It's our land."

Now a part of New River State Park, Elk Shoals is located on Methodist Camp Road, off Boggs Road in Ashe County.














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In our neck of the woods, there are plenty of folks who share what they have with their neighbors - after all, that is what community is all about.

Building community through the breaking of bread and sharing a meal, does wonders for everyone involved. I'd like to tell you about several such meals that are enjoyed by all who attend them in this area.

Mount Zion Methodist Church in Piney Creek provides a free community meal the first Thursday of every month. They have been doing this for several years and have an average monthly attendance of over 80 people. The meal is served at 6:00pm, although there is a core group of regulars who come early for a pre-meal visit.

Just before the meal is served, the pastor, Jaclyn Tookey, blesses the meal and calls for the (less ambulatory) "Cane Brigade". A pew is set up for them to wait and then they are the first to be served.

"I enjoy being a part of the monthly community meal at Mt. Zion because of the fellowship within the community that it brings together," says congregation member Kathy Murphy. "Folks from ages 1 to 100 hundred come together for dinner, the laughter and conversations warm my heart—It is an incredibly uplifting place to be!"

With compassion and cheerful hearts, volunteers prepare and serve the meal each month. When neighbors come together in Piney Creek, the warmth of hearts can be felt and seen in all the smiles around the tables.

Grace Kitchen is a community meal offered Wednesday evenings, all year around, at the Methodist Church in Sparta. Serving is from 4:30-6:00pm and the weekly attendance averages around 90-100 people for dinner. Grace was started two years ago by a trio of friends who wanted to bring neighbors together in an atmosphere of love and acceptance. Though Grace Kitchen is faith based, it is non denominational and open to everyone. The purpose of this meal is to build relationships and



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get to know a person who you might not otherwise get a chance to meet. It's encouraging to see 2 mothers sitting together over a meal as they talk about what is going on in their busy season of life with small children.

A few weeks ago, there were three men that had the Vietnam war experience in common and it brought them together in a truly unique way—sharing that part of their past, and finding comfort in talking with each other and shared experiences.

Grace Kitchen offers a place of acceptance, love and listening. People can relate in many positive ways through the connection of sharing a meal together. It is truly uplifting and heartwarming.

God's Storehouse, at 260 North Main Street in Galax, is a wonderful soup kitchen (and SO much more) where people from the community can gather three nights a week and share a meal.

"It is a mission of the heart that I felt led to because in this time of social media and constant communication, it felt ironic to me that people seemed less inclined to look each other in the eyes and really connect."

Serving meals for 6 years, Kisha and Delina took the helm 4 years ago and now they have community groups that often come and serve.

Kisha Johnson of God's Storehouse says that she and her mom see so much good in people before they are able to see it in themselves. She referenced a story of a young woman who came into God's Storehouse one evening and did not even realize how she'd gotten there. She was struggling with many difficult things in her life and had no place to turn for help. Over the next hour, this young woman was able

to have a meal, tell her story and find compassion and hope. Eventually, this same girl began to attend God's Storehouse regularly, help with serving meals and she found the help she needed to change the

On any given evening, there might be a youth group or other volunteer presence giving back and laughing with guests as they make their way through the line to receive their meal.

Along with dinner, guests enjoy lively conversation, laughter and encouragement. This is an incredibly friendly place to find community with your neighbors.

Serving an average of 150 folks each night, God's Storehouse also delivers to those who are unable to attend on their own.

Ashe Outreach Ministries in Creston, NC is an energetic group of volunteers that brings

people together to "eat well to help others eat".

Twice a month, at the Riverview Community Center, Ashe Outreach hosts their community fish fry to raise funds to support their efforts in fighting food insecurity in Ashe County.

"Our fish fry is a community event and attendance averages about 200 people," says Dillon Culbreth.

"Our volunteers come together to meet a need and give of themselves."

From 4-8:00pm on the first and third Fridays of the month, they welcome everyone to enjoy a meal of fish, chicken (or both), slaw, hushpuppies, fries, slaw, dessert and a drink. Depending on your appetite

you can choose from small, medium, or large servings that range from \$10 to \$15 - children under 10 eat for free.

All funds raised through the Friday Fish Fry go to support four food programs: community meals, the food pantry, the school backpack program, and mobile meals.

As a resident of these spectacular

ound and enjoyed wild throughout our area, we are also fortunate to have blueberry farms/patches/growers providing fresh and delicious berries in season.

Low-growing and plentiful wild blueberries are tiny, purple drops of sweetness that can be eaten by the handful. They are smaller than their big, juicy cultivated cousins - maybe less than half the size. So,

cultivated blueberries may fit in one cup, that same size cup will hold more than 150 wild blueberries. If you know where they grow, gathering them can be a outing. If you find them unexpectedly they are a memorable and sweet surprise.

Locally grown berries In operation for 15 years, can be found at produce farmers markets in Alleghany, Ashe and Grayson Counties.

Beside the New River, River Ridge Organics on Battlefield Road in Mouth of Wilson, VA grows organic blueberries, raspberries and red raspberries along the New River.

Manager Jay Dunbar is passionate about the berries he grows, taking care of the land with ecological practices and making it sustainable.

"Berries, as a whole, are a super healthy product," says Dunbar. "Science has proven their benefit, we're growing them at nature's pace - caring for the land and caring for the people – net positive."

River Ridge Organics serves a diverse market. Their berries are sold to a variety customers that include breweries, restaurants, and grocery stores. Locally, you can find River Ridge Organics' berries at the Independence and Sparta Farmers markets. Stay up-to-date with River Ridge Organics through though perhaps 80 or 90 Instagram and Facebook.

This June 29th, River Ridge Organics is hosting a Berry Festival and welcoming visitors to visit the farm, music berries, community.

V-G Berry Farm on Link Road, just outside of Galax is a "blueberry only" you-pick-it farm. their unique set up protects their approximately 180 bushes with bird netting saving more berries for the pickers.


Ripening and picking begins in late June and runs five to six weeks into mid-August. Families are encouraged to come and enjoy the picking experience, or you can call ahead and they will pick berries for you.

V-G Berry Farm is open Monday through Friday 4-7pm, Saturdays 10am to 5pm, and Sundays 1 to 5pm. For more info follow them on Facebook.

Old Orchard Creek is a historic artisanal Appalachian mountain farm in raising blueberries using sustainable farming practices. Located in Lansing, North Carolina, their blueberries are usually available from late June through early August. You can pick your own berries or phone ahead and reserve ready-picked berries and/ or local delivery. FunFacts about blueberries

- 1. There are two types of blueberries, highbush and lowbush.
- 2. Highbush blueberries are the types you commonly find at grocery stores and farmers markets.
- 3. Lowbush blueberries are smaller, sweeter blueberries often used for processing into juices, jams, blueberry muffin mixes and so on.
- Ten states grow 98 percent of U.S. blueberries: California, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Michigan, Mississippi, New Jersey, North Carolina, Oregon and Washington.
- 5. North American highbush blueberry production has increased by more than 500 million pounds in the past 20 years.
- 6. Peak blueberry season in most of the country runs from mid-June to mid-August. However, Florida blueberries have their peak production season in March and April.
- 7. Blueberries freeze in just 4 minutes.
- 8. One cup of blueberries contains 80 calories, 3.6 grams of fiber and 25 percent of the recommended daily amount of vitamin C.
- 9. Blueberries have high levels of antioxidants, such as anthocyanins – the compounds that color blueberries
- 10. Fresh blueberry consumption per person more than doubled between 2007 and 2012, from 0.5 to 1.2 pounds.





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Along the Appalachian Trail

I confess, I am not up to speed on wildflowers. However, lets begin this chapter on the trail and discover some along the way.

The Mt. Rogers Appalachian Trail Club is one of the 31, all-volunteer organizations that takes care of the 2,190 miles of trail. In contrast to cleaning privies, one of their more enjoyable duties is monitoring the rare plants along the trail.

My friend Carol Broderson chairs the Natural Resources Committee at the club, and she told me a little of their recent adventures on what she calls "the best couple of AT miles for wildflower viewing, Whitetop to Elk Garden, VA route 600 (dgif.virginia.gov/vbwt/sites/elk-garden).

In 1970 the United States Forest Service designated this area as part of the Mt. Rogers National Recreation Area,

due to "exceptional biological interest." The spruce fir forest harbors an amazing diversity of flora and fauna. Spring is the exciting time to investigate the 'shy' woodland wildflowers, those that bloom as quickly as possible before the tree canopy removes their access to sunshine, known as the ephemeral event.

In the second week of May, the woods between Whitetop and Elk Garden are blanketed with wildflowers: spring beauty, trout lily, wood anemone, may apple, Solomon's seal and the very showy rosy twisted stalk are a few of the many varieties.



The Mt. Rogers Club leads several wildflower hikes there in early May, but in addition to the more common spring beauties, they also look for the rarely seen and try to keep track of their occurrence. On May 5th, the group led a rare plant hike. One of their main goals was to discover small mountain bittercress, which had not been noted in many years. Bittercress is a member of the mustards, a large family which provides many plants for our gardens: broccoli, cauliflower, kale, radish, turnip, and many herbs. There are many bittercress cousins too. Pennsylvania bittercress if one of the first tiny white spring wildflowers we see in our gardens. Later, another cousin, creasy greens, will blanket the hayfields. Small mountain bittercress is much harder to find, but the group discovered many of the plants on the May 5 hike.

They also monitored American umbrella leaf, a plant with huge leaves that prefers damp areas. Umbrella leaf, though rare, is fairly abundant along that section of trail. In the barberry family, the plant has two, alternate, stalked leaves each reaching twenty four inches in length. The numerous flowers, ½ to ¾ inches wide with 6 white petals, are perched above the leaves by a long stalked cyme.







Though it does not bloom until summer, the group noted the leaves of greater Indian plantain, another rare plant. And masses of fringed phacelia lit up the hill-sides in great profusion. This is one of the "rare" plants responsible for the often used phrase, "rare but locally plentiful." In the waterleaf family, phacelias are also called scorpionweeds. Plants are typically 'hairy' with alternate simple or compound leaves. The flowers usually begin as coiled clusters, uncoiling as they mature.


With spring now moving into summer, and the ephemeral flower show over, we turn our attention to some specialties of summer. Two rarities that the club will be looking for this summer follow:

Roan Mountain rattlesnakeroot is in the aster family, and found in Tennessee, North Carolina and Virginia. The flowers,









bell shaped and nodding, bloom in late summer and early fall.

One of the showiest summer bloomers is Gray's lily, named after one of America's leading 19th century botanists, Asa Gray. This lily prefers balds and other openings at high elevations, and that leads to another job of the AT club, helping to keep open spaces open.

The MRATC is planning a work project to foster bird and rare plant habitat by clearing hawthorns and invasive plants from the field across from Elk Garden. The MRATC is a great resource for the trail bound adventurer. If you would like to monitor wildflowers or help with service projects, please email the club. mtrogersatc@gmail.com

THE MOUNTAIN SOUND AT THE BLUE RIDGE MUSIC CENTER

The Blue Ridge Music Center, located at milepost 213 on the Blue Ridge Parkway near Galax, Virginia, celebrates the music and musicians of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Open through November 3, the visitor center includes the Roots of American Music Museum as well as scenic trails for novice and seasoned hikers. Live music presentations include Midday Mountain Music, offered daily noon to 4 p.m. in the covered breezeway, and concerts on Saturday evenings in the outdoor amphitheater, Memorial Day through Labor Day.

Every day during the free Midday Mountain Music sessions, local musicians pick and play and tell their stories. They volunteer their time and talents to entertain and educate visitors for the pure love of the music. Among them is Willard Gayheart, who plays twice a week for nearly four hours with his son-in-law, Scott Freeman. Gayheart is one of the founders of the afternoon series. He and the late Bobby Patterson kicked off the program 12 years ago.

"Bobby and I went out there one day and it kind of took off," says Gayheart, who claims playing the guitar for visitors is keeping him young in his 80s. One of Gayheart's favorite aspects of being a Midday Mountain Musician is meeting visitors from around the globe. Last summer alone he recalls talking with people from

Gayheart's new CD, At Home in the Blue Ridge, came out on May 24. Produced by Teddy Thompson and recorded at Front Porch Gallery in Woodlawn, it includes Gayheart's original songs as well as old favorites. The CD is a family affair, and

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
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

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Blueberry Dumplings

Fruit and syrup:

4 cups of fresh blueberries, elderberries or blackberries

1½ cups water

½ tsp. vanilla

2 dashes of nutmeg

1 Tbls. Lemon juice

4 Tbls. Butter, melted

1 ¼ cups sugar mixed with 1/8 cup flour

Mix all ingredients together and put in a large cooking pot. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Mixture will thicken within 5 minutes after beginning to boil. Turn down to a simmer. Mix up dumplings...

Dumplings:

2 cups Bisquick

3 Tbls. Sugar + 1 dash nutmeg

2/3 cups milk

Stir together. Drop by tablespoonful onto hot bubbling fruit and syrup.

Makes 8 large dumplings. Simmer uncovered for 10 minutes. Cover and simmer 10 minutes more. Serve hot with ice cream or fresh whipped cream.

This recipe came from my dear Maternal Grandmother, Hazel Stamm.

She made this for us during our childhood and into our teen years until she passed away. She was a fabulous cook and baker and taught me a lot in the kitchen from the time I was 5 years old. I stood on a kitchen chair beside her and learned this recipe.

She was the most amazing woman and we loved her dearly! I hope you enjoy!

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
